Chairman's Notes January 2017

So we are in the New Year and into the last quarter of the Parish financial year. In our December Parish Council meeting we approved the new precept which was slightly up by 1.7% on last year's precept. This was driven mainly by reductions in government grants and some rising costs. We have made sure that we are protecting, as best we can, the services which the Parish Council is responsible.

The Neighbourhood Plan was voted through in January 2014 and we are required by law to review it, refresh it where necessary and have a vote on the revised copy. As many will know the Plan has been crucial in preventing building on sites which were not approved by the vote. It stood up to High Court appeals from people who would want to go against what residents agreed. As we go through the process of consultation and revision we will look to stay true to the intent of the current plan, which controls new building, but we will need everyone's support when it comes to a vote. Watch out for more on this as we go through the year.

There has been quite a lot of discussion on social media asking about progress on the Leisure Centre and the Health Centre despite the regular updates in Broughton Matters. We will look at increasing use of social media to get the message out but we will still continue to use Broughton Matters and our parish web site www.broughton-astley.gov.uk to publicise what we are doing.

With regards to the Leisure Centre we are still on schedule. Within the next two months we will be receiving initial offers from prospective companies to design, build, operate and maintain the new facility. We will have to select one provider and then work with them to ensure we get the centre we want. The plan is to have the centre open around September - October 2018. There is a lot to do but it is full steam ahead. As I have said previously, as soon as we have images and layouts we can share we will do so.

As regards the new medical building, this is the responsibility of the practice and the commissioning group. The S106 agreement, which we helped to negotiate with the developers, provides the land which reduces the cost significantly but the funding depends on the commissioning group. The medical practice is keen to move to bigger facilities but can only do so with additional funding. The medical practice is not well funded in the first place and they are having discussions to address this matter. They have asked the Parish Council to write a letter of support for increased funding related to the potential move, which it will do immediately.

CAROL CONCERT

The Parish Council held its annual Christmas Carol Concert for residents on Friday 9 December 2016. On the evening, following generous donations and a raffle, £550 was raised towards the ongoing good work of Leicester South Salvation Army.

I am pleased to advise that after the event a kind donation of £100 was received from Sapcote Engineering Ltd; therefore, a total of £650 has been presented to the Salvation Army.

Thanks again to everyone who made a monetary donation or provided a raffle prize.

COTTAGE LANE – TEMPORARY ROAD CLOSURE

A Temporary Traffic Regulation Order (TTRO) is to be made for Cottage Lane, Broughton Astley. The purpose of the TTRO is to facilitate a gas main connection by Western Power and as such will incorporate a temporary road closure.

The duration of the closure is for a period not exceeding 5 days and will commence on 13 February 2017.

SKATEPARK

Plans have been made to make some necessary repairs to the Skatepark on Frolesworth Road, which will take place in mid-January 2017.

Minimal disruption to the use of the Skatepark is anticipated during the works, but any piece of equipment that is not safe to use during this time will be fenced off and signage erected.

A full refurbishment of the equipment is planned for late 2017 early 2018.

The Parish Council learnt with sadness that a former, long serving member of Broughton Astley Parish Council passed away peacefully on 22 December 2016 in Weymouth. Margot served as a Parish Councillor for just over 17 years, during which time she held the position of Chairman from 2001-2002.

Baga Bill says:

February

When conditions permit, cut the grass with mower blades set as high as they'll go. This will keep it under control, as otherwise it'll be like a hayfield by spring – but leave it alone in very wet or frosty weather.

Open packs of potatoes and set them up for chitting as soon as possible.

Cover the soil with plastic sheeting or cloches to warm it up before making the valuable first early sowings.

Complete winter pruning of trees and bushes.

March

Have a good tidy up all round the garden. Weed beds and borders, dig up and divide any overgrown perennial plants. Keep the hoe moving through the soil at every opportunity.

Sow seeds of parsnips, leeks, carrots, peas, beetroot, lettuce and broad beans. Sow sweet peas and other hardy annuals in pots or trays in a cold greenhouse or in a cold frame. Sow tomatoes on a warm windowsill indoors.



LOCAL PLANNING MATTERS

The Parish Council's Planning and Licensing Committee usually meets once a fortnight to consider its views on planning applications that have been submitted to the planning authority (Harborough District Council).

The Parish Council is formally consulted during the planning application process but any resident can express their personal views on-line via www.harborough.gov.uk/view-and-comment-on-planning-applications

- 3 The Mews, Blenheim Crescent - Certificate of lawfulness of proposed development for the erection of a pitched roof

New Signs Warn Dog Owners to be Responsible!

New signs have been put up across the Harborough district urging dog owners to walk their pets responsibly.

The signs warn dog owners that they could face fixed fines of £500 – or up to £1,000 if convicted – if they allow their dog to foul, do not put it on a lead when instructed, or fail to produce a bag to pick after their pets.

Earlier this year Harborough District Council adopted new powers, under the Antisocial Behaviour, Crime and Policing Act 2014, to create Public Spaces Protection Orders (PSPOs).

The new and enhanced powers, which were backed by the public, are now being used to tackle irresponsible dog ownership in the district. Find out more at www.harborough.gov.uk/dogcontrols

Have You Got Your Green Bin Sticker?

Subscriptions are now open for residents in the Harborough district to have their garden waste collected from April 2017.

Harborough District Council is inviting residents to sign up for an annual subscription fee of £40 per green bin.

Those who sign up for the service will have their garden waste collected on a fortnightly basis between the months of April 2017 and November 2017 and during March 2018. Garden waste collections will not take place during the winter months of December and February. A one-off garden waste collection will take place in January 2018.

Last year, nearly 19,000 residents in the Harborough district signed up to the garden waste collection service.

Garden waste will be continue to be collected from all green bins displaying a sticker on the same days as the blue-lidded recycling bins unless residents have previously been notified of a different arrangement.

Residents are encouraged to subscribe before 3 March 2017 to ensure they receive their green bin sticker by 1 April 2017.

February and March can be most unpredictable months, both in terms of weather and the speed at which nature responds to it, sunshine, snow, frost wet and windy are all possibilities and in any combination; sometimes all on the same day! But nature battles on and delivers our seasonal way markers, snowdrops, daffodils, etc. to cheer us on until the spring riot of green and colour arrive.

We live in a country that provides us with a green backcloth for much of the year, but in these early months of the year if you look closely at the emerging plants and leaves, the greens that are appearing now are pristine and glisten like jewels in the sun. They have that brand spanking new look, unaffected by the the dust, wind and rain that will dull their shine in the coming weeks. It is amazing just how many shades of green there are, to say nothing of leaf shapes and form.

Over the years garden designers have exploited this variety of green plants to create gardens which are not centred on flowers but natures green palate, using the plant shapes and textures for interest and contrasts.



One very interesting shaped leaf that always catches my eye in early spring is Lords-and-Ladies (*Arum maculatum*). Also known as Cuckoo pint, Jack in the pulpit and Naked boys! These names are mostly referring to the large spathe which has a central spadix, a small fleshy club like spike, bearing minute flowers enclosed within the spathe, a characteristic of all Arums.

Our native *Arum maculatum* is a common woodland plant species and usually has plain green arrow shaped leaves. The Italian version of Lords-and-Ladies is *Arum italicum*, is a relative species which has naturalised after escaping from gardens and is now not unusual to find in the wild. This plants leaves are also arrow shaped but can bear quite striking marbled patterns on the leaf. The plant grows 30–46 cm (1–1.5 ft.) high, with equal spread and the markings can be in various shades of cream to grey. In addition to the leaf marking *Arum italicum* can also be identified by the yellow spadix and a yellowish spathe which has with no purplish edges.


Development of our village continues apace and we watch anxiously to see if the roadside patches of wild Cowslip - *Primula veris* along Broughton Way survive the new developments.

As in life, circumstance produce winners and losers as some wild flowers, including some orchids, only germinate after the ground has been disturbed. It's usually interesting to see what turns up after groundwork has moved the soil around so keep an eye out for unusual plants!

Whilst I have been writing this article on 4 January 2017, six Lesser Redpolls came onto the silver birch tree in the garden and were feeding ravenously for about an hour. The weatherman says the wind is going to move round and blow from the north which is probably an indicator that we shall see more winter migrants visiting our gardens in the coming weeks. Silver Birch and Alder trees are staple food for many small birds, both our local populations and migratory species at a time when there is little else around. Both species of trees seed prolifically and reliably giving the birds a secure source of food during the winter months. Plant one in your garden if you can and get some of these rare visitors into your patch.

Broughton Astley Naturespot celebrated its fifth birthday in 2016 and it is very satisfying to look at the achievements in that time.

In our village we have had over 7700 records consisting of 1300 different species which is pretty amazing. As you may expect these records are weighted towards the flowers, birds and moths, but there are some interesting records too of the lesser mortals. For example we have had 22 species of Slugs & Snails, 21 species of Butterflies and 31 species of Hoverfly.



This is excellent and thanks to all who have contributed records and added to our knowledge of wildlife in Broughton Astley.

IS YOUR VEHICLE SECURE?

- ➔ Leave it on show expect it to go! Always remove valuables from your vehicle
- ➔ Remove sat navs including the support cradle and cables. Wipe away any suction pad marks
- ➔ Don't leave tools in vans overnight
- ➔ Make sure that doors are locked, windows are closed and keys are removed when you leave the car, even if it's only for a moment
- ➔ On icy mornings, never leave your vehicle unattended with the engine running
- ➔ Park your vehicle in a well-lit area that is visible to others, or covered by CCTV
- ➔ If you have a garage, use it. Always lock your vehicle and garage
